

#### Hierarchy in Dutch business culture

- Flexible and open
- Less regard for authority
- Informal and direct (first name basis)

#### Meetings and discussions

- Fixed times and punctual
- Protocols and set agendas
- All members expected to contribute

### Negotiations

- Straight to the point
- Forceful, stubborn and tough negotiators
- Honesty and reliability
- Be on time!
- Never make a promise you can not keep



# Working and living in the Netherlands

### At work

- Working conditions
  - Working hours
  - Regular breaks
  - Normally 8 hours p/day / 36-40 hours p/week

### Working safely

- Employer must ensure safety
- With risk employer supplies safety equipment
- Employee obliged to use these

### Equal treatment

- Dutch law prohibits treating people differently
- Hiring, assign benefits and/or dismissal

### Equal payment

- Same work, same reward
- Employer may not take advantage
- Experience counts








# Why working in The Netherlands?

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# Job opportunities for graduates

- Good chances of finding work with multinationals
- The majority of first job offers are temporary 1 year contracts
- Graduates are expected to have a degree in a related discipline
- Many times relevant working experience is required
- Major industries: IT, Chemicals, Food processing,
- Engineering, Sales & Marketing

- You are interested in working in another EU28 country + Iceland and Norway


#### Financial support





# Wages & Taxes

Legal minimum wage (gross), depending on age
21 and older legal minimum wage
Monthly € 1.653,60 gross
Weekly € 381,60 gross

18-21 years old: lower percentage

Collective labour agreement (CAO)



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Income tax and social contributions
 Between 36,25% and 52%, depending on income
 If worked < 1 year, partly refund paid tax possible</li>



# HOLIDAYS

- 4 x number of working days a week
- 2 weeks in a row, rest upon agreement
- Only 6 bank holidays
- 8% of the annual salary extra holiday money paid in May



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# **Before you leave**

- Check the contract
- You need a valid identity document
- Open an EURO bank account in your own country
- Sufficient means of support (for the first month)

# What to do after arrival

- Take a health insurance (obligatory!)
- Find accommodation (high rents in Amsterdam)
- Civil Service Number (BSN) Work <u>< 4 months</u>: apply for the BSN with the RNI-counter <u>www.newinthenetherlands.nl</u>
  - Work <u>> 4 months</u>: register at the municipality,
  - you will receive a BSN number automatically



KNOWLEDGE of ENGLISH is IMPORTANT! BUT: START to learn DUTCH if you want to stay!
